This year - It's time for a Latin America Concert Tour!

MUSIC OR DANCE CONCERT TOUR TO PERU

Day One:

Arrival in Lima, Peru; transfer by air to Pucallpa later in the afternoon. There will be a dance welcome for the group at the airport upon arrival. Board a private bus to the Hotel-Resort **Divina Montaña**. After dinner and cultural reception this evening in your honor.

Day Two:

After breakfast at the hotel, travel by land to the Shipibo Community of San Francisco. Tour of community and partake in a conversation with a local spiritual leader, Antonio Burga. In the afternoon there will be a **concert** arranged for the group followed by a communal Lunch with locals; later in the day will be a presentation of folk arts and crafts for the groups to share and enjoy. At the end of the day there, we will have the opportunity for a joint **concert** with others in the community's Spiritual Center. Return travel to Port of Yarinacocha and to the hotel for dinner and a cultural presentation that evening.



Day Three:

After breakfast, travel by water to the port of Hoyada Pucallpillo and by land from the port to the community of Shambo. There will be a communal reception (spiritual ceremony) and communal traditional Lunch (Asado de pescado; humado; patarashca). After the lunch we have the opportunity to choose between hiking in the forest with local guide, artesanal fishing with local fisherman, or joining in a talk with the local female Shaman. Travel by boat back to the hotel. Stopping for dinner and **concertizing** in small islands in the way. Dinner and the hotel

Day Four:

After breakfast, visit to the studio of renowned local painter Pablo Amaringo and then enjoy lunch with various artists at the Hotel. **Concert** at the Cathedral of Pucallpa, followed by dinner and cultural presentation at the hotel.

Day Five:

After breakfast, transfer to the Port of Pucallpa and by boat to the village of Callerias. There the group will be invited to **participate** in a popular feast and reception with Interactive music, Dance, arts and crafts, ceremonies, traditional games. Communal lunch to follow; then travel from Callerias to Pucallpa. Afternoon arrival at Hotel. Meetings with Local Choir or Dance leaders; in the late afternoon we will visit arts and craft sites in Pucallpa until dinner in the hotel

Day Six:

After breakfast, the group will have time for shopping in Pucallpa; travel to the airport- Airport of Pucallpa. There will be a farewell ceremony in the group's honor and then we all travel to Lima for our departure. Overnight near the airport.

Day Seven:

After breakfast at the transit hotel, we will have an optional tour of the capital city, then a transfer to the airport for our journey back from Lima back to the United States.

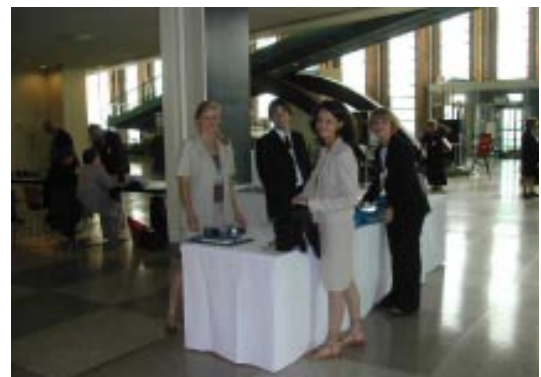

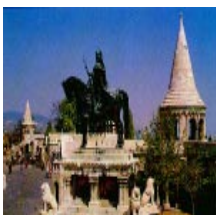

Day 2, SUNDAY

Tour of Antigua and its colonial historic treasures: **Concert** in the Cathedral, Plaza Mayor of Antigua. Visits to the Palace del Ayuntamiento, the University of San Carlos, as well as local religious institutions of historic and cultural value. A noted, local architectural historian will lead us on a visit of private colonial houses. Dining at leading local restaurants.

Day 3, MONDAY

Flight from Guatemala City Airport – to fascinating Tikal National Park, “The Capital of the Mayan Empire,” home to spectacular and prominent Mayan temples, ruins and natural wonders. Lodging at the ecological “Villa Maya.” **Concert** at the foot of the Piramida Central. Sailing through beautiful Rio La Pasion, and lake Petexguatun, unique visit and lunch with the hidden and little known Indigenous community “Los Escarbados.” Jungle tour and presentations on the history, culture and beliefs of the Mayas. Dinner at the hotel.

Day 4, TUESDAY

Visit to the Tikal National Park, its monuments and surrounding areas. Authentic Mayan cultural activities, performances and participatory demonstrations by the Mayas Cofradia (Mayan brotherhood). Late afternoon return flight from Tikal to La Antigua. Dinner and Marimba music at the Posada. Evening free for shopping and sightseeing.

Day 5, WEDNESDAY

Departure from Antigua by land to the fabled and mysterious Lago Atitlan, an historic lake surrounded by 3 volcanoes and 12 fascinating indigenous villages. Lodging at the “Posada de Don Rodrigo – Atitlan.” Tour by boat to visit the native communities of Santiago Atitlan, San Antonio Palopo and Sta. Catarina. In each community we will explore their artisan, textile and musical handiworks. Tour through the open market in quaint Panajachel. In the late afternoon we will travel to the nearby Mayan Sanctuary of Solola to partake in a private Mayan religious and musical ceremony to bid farewell to the sunset over the lake Atitlan. A group of Mayan spiritual guides will lead us in celebration culminating with a group meal and the opportunity to engage in stimulating conversation.

Day 6, THURSDAY

We travel to Chichicastenango to visit the largest outdoor indigenous market. After lunch we will visit the monolith ruins of IXIMCHE at Tecpa. The evening and night are reserved for a private, authentic and elaborate street Cultural Fiesta organized to greet us by CEDIG, a local rural community in the city of Parramos, an authentic Guatemalan peasant community. **Concert** at the Cathedral of Parramos. The entire Parramos community is invited and we will enjoy regional folk music, performances and delectable local food. Departure to the Posada in Antigua.

Day 7, FRIDAY

A visit to “La Azotea”, a complex of three museums exhibiting the variety of traditional Guatemalan clothing styles and the evolution of folkloric Guatemalan musical instruments. We will enjoy a series of cultural activities, including sharing a meal with local dancers and musicians, as well as a field visit with a renowned Shaman. We will visit your choice of either the CIRMA center for pre-Columbian research or the Universidad Landivar for an introduction to higher education in Guatemala. **Concert** at the famous Capuccina Ruins in Antigua. Free time for shopping and sightseeing in Antigua. Dinner and farewell activities in Antigua.

Day 8, SATURDAY

Departure from Antigua- Guatemala to the Guatemala City International Airport for the journey back home.

Date in 2003: July 3-6*More, page 10***Is your group traveling this summer or next? Here are some tips to remember:**

- Make three photocopies of passports, international and U.S. Drivers Permits, visas, and the itinerary. Leave one set at home, put one in the carry on luggage, and one in the stored luggage.
- Call and verify that your insurance company will cover medical care received in other countries. Medicare, generally, does not.
- Never at the time of a security check-in, nor at any time in the airport, should a passenger make jokes about guns, bombs, or hijacking.
- Take a brochure or business card from the hotel when you go off on your own, in case you get lost later on!
- Women traveling with handbags should only travel with those that zip completely shut and should carry them across their chest or under a coat or sweater. Men should always keep their wallets in their front pocket or use a money belt.
- The amount of duty free you can bring home ranges from \$200-\$1200, depending on the destination. Go to www.customs.gov/travel/travel.htm to know before you go!

**VESZPRÉM SUMMER FESTIVAL**

Location: Veszprém

Description: A festival that encompasses folklore shows, classical and modern music concerts, film screening, dance performances, theater nights and folk art fairs, offering superb entertainment to every generation.

Date in 2003: August 1-20

19TH INTERNATIONAL DIXIELAND FESTIVAL

Location: Miskolc

Description: One of the most prestigious events among the Miskolc summer programmes and noted even outside of Europe, the Festival is a meeting place of excellent Hungarian and foreign musicians, performing in the Diósgyőr Castle, to the great delight of Dixie fans. The host of the festival is the world-famous Benkó Dixiland Band. During the festival Dixie will be played on the town squares, in pubs and on the open-air stages.

Description: Every year, the best productions of Hungarian fringe theater is paraded at this festival, which also gives an opportunity to foreign artists and troupes from various theatrical genres to introduce themselves to the Hungarian audience. The wide range of programmes includes open-air performances, exhibitions, concerts and film screenings.

Date in 2003: July 19-25

18TH MATYÓFÖLD INTERNATIONAL FOLK DANCE FESTIVAL

Location: Mezőkövesd

Description: Foreign and Hungarian folk dance troupes will present their shows at several venues at this event. Participating ensembles arrive on Friday and make performances in the area on Saturday. To conclude the festival, the troupes will go down the main street of the town with a spectacular procession dance before giving a gala show.

Location: Budapest

Description: This festival offers an insight into the rich Jewish culture. Day 3:

A ski day in the resort of Pamporovo, 20 min outside Chepelare. Professional instructors, good equipment and facilities, wide-range of ski slopes. A welcome reception hosted by the Mayor of Chepelare.

Day 4:

Depart for the unique architectural reserve of Shiroka Luka, a walking tour and a visit to the ethnographic museum. Meet with the students from the Professional Musical School there, one of the best in Bulgaria, enjoy a presentation of the typical musical instruments for the region. After lunch transfer to Smolayn, the regional administrative center and have a joint concert with a local cultural group. Dinner in Chepelare.

Day 5:

A ski day in Pamporovo, entertainment and skiing all day long. Those who want to relax in the afternoon can enjoy the indoor pools, sauna and shopping centers in the resort. A farewell dinner in a typical Rhodopian restaurant in Pamporovo.

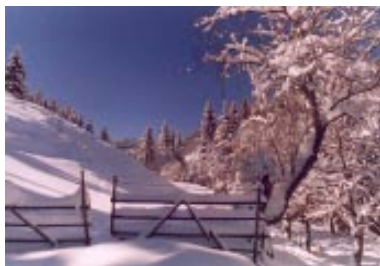
Day 6:

Visit to the only ski factory on the Balkans, see how ski and snowboards are produced in front of you. Depart for Plovdiv, the cultural "capital" of Bulgaria via Bachkovo. Visit the second largest monastery in Bulgaria and have lunch in Bachkovo. In the evening have a solo performance in a Renaissance art gallery in the Old Town of Plovdiv.

NOTE: (Depending on the flight schedule, they either have a free morning to shop in the Old Town and go to SF in the afternoon to catch their plane or if have a morning flight the next day have a free day in Plovdiv and depart early for SF the next morning. I think it would be better if they have a free day in Plovdiv to do their shopping.)

Day 7:

Take a walking tour of the UNESCO's protected Old Town in Plovdiv and enjoy the afternoon on your own. Dinner. (OR transfer to SF in the afternoon and fly back.)

Early morning transfer to Sofia

and fly back home.

Day 3:

After breakfast, depart for the Trigrad George, a naturally rich and beautiful area, famous with its cave phenomena. Visit one of the most beautiful caves on the Balkans and enjoy a barbecue amidst the picturesque meadows for lunch. In the early afternoon visit the cave where Orpheus went down to hell to find his beloved Euridyce. Transfer back and have a special reception hosted by the Mayor of Chepelare.

Day 4:

Depart for the unique architectural reserve of Shiroka Luka, a walking tour and a visit to the ethnographic museum. Meet with the students from the Professional Musical School there, one of the best in Bulgaria, enjoy a presentation of the typical musical instruments for the region. After lunch transfer back to Chepelare and take a hiking tour to the National Astronomy Observatory. A transfer to Chepelare followed by a dinner at your hotel.

Day 5:

After breakfast, depart for the natural phenomenon – The Bridges of Wonder; a magnificent rock formation - once big caves whose floors were destroyed by the water, now unique enormous bridges. Have lunch in a traditional Rhodopian restaurant on the way back. Rehearse and have a joint concert in the evening with local choir groups in Chepelare. Dinner.

Day 6:

Depart for Plovdiv, the cultural "capital" of Bulgaria via Bachkovo. Visit the second largest monastery in Bulgaria and have lunch in Bachkovo. In the evening check into your hotel and enjoy some time on your own. Dinner.

Day 7:

Take a walking tour of the UNESCO's protected Old Town in Plovdiv in the morning. The Festival starts! Have a solo performance in a Renaissance art gallery in the Old Town. Dinner.

Day 8:

After breakfast have a meeting with a local cultural group. The festival continues, have a joint concert in one of the many beautiful venues in the Old Town (the ethnographic museum). Dinner.

Day 9:

Enjoy the morning for shopping and walk-around. In the afternoon all the participants in the Festival make an outdoor concert on the centuries-old Roman amphitheater. A farewell dinner.

Day 10:

Transfer to Sofia and fly back home.

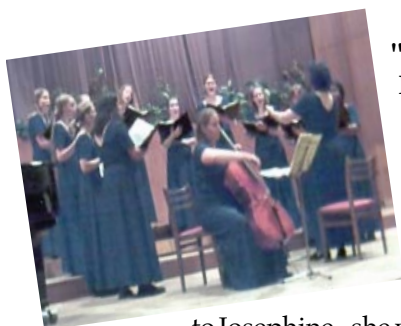
